24	IV. REVENUE REPORTS
25	CHAIRMAN JONES: At this point, we'd
	9

- 1 like to call Revenue Reports. Good
- morning and welcome back. 2

3	MS. JACKSON: Good morning, Chairman
4	Jones, Board Members. My name is Donna
5	Jackson with the Louisiana State Police.
6	The riverboat revenue report for
7	July 2014 is shown on page one of your
8	handout. During July, the 14 operating
9	riverboats generated Adjusted Gross
10	Receipts \$151,569,963, an increase of
11	\$9 million or 6.5 percent from last
12	month, but a decrease of \$2 million or
13	1 percent from July 2013. During July,
14	the State collected fees totaling
15	\$32,587,542.
16	Next is a summary of the July 2014
17	gaming activity for Harrah's New Orleans
18	found on page three. During July,
19	Harrah's generated \$28,502,826 in gross
20	gaming revenue. July revenues were down
21	\$1.4 million or almost 5 percent from
22	last month but up \$3 million or 12.4
23	percent from July 2013. During July,
24	the State received \$5,095,890 in minimum
25	daily payments.
	10
1	Slots at the Racetracks revenues are
2	shown on page four. During July, the
3	four racetrack facilities combined
4	generated Adjusted Gross Receipts of
5	\$32,914,608, an increase of \$1.7 million

6	or 5.6 percent from last month, but a
7	decrease of 2 percent from July 2013.
8	During July, the State collected fees
9	totaling \$4,993,146.
10	Overall, Riverboats, Land-Based and
11	Slots at the Racetracks combined
12	generated \$213 million in AGR and almost
13	\$43 million in state fees.
14	CHAIRMAN JONES: Are there any
15	questions from the Board? [No
16	response.] Proceed.
17	MS. JACKSON: Harrah's New Orleans
18	is required to maintain at least 2,400
19	employees and bi-weekly payroll of
20	\$1,750,835. This report covers the
21	three pay periods in July 2014.
22	For the first pay period, the Audit
23	Section verified 2,442 employees with a
24	payroll of \$1,978,000. For the second
25	pay period, the Audit Section verified
	11
1	2,459 employees with a payroll of
2	\$1,982,000. For the third pay period,
3	the Audit Section verified 2,455
4	employees with a payroll of \$1,964,000.
5	Therefore, Harrah's met the employment
6	criteria during July.
7	CHAIRMAN JONES: Okay. Any
8	questions from the Board? [No

9	response.] Thank you so much. Welcome
10	back.
11	MS. JACKSON: Thank you.
12	CHAIRMAN JONES: Video gaming. Good
13	morning.
14	MR. BOSSIER: Good morning, Chairman
15	Jones and Board Members. My name is Jim
16	Bossier with Louisiana State Police
17	Gaming Audit Section. I'm reporting
18	video gaming statistics for July 2014 as
19	shown on page one of your handout.
20	Sixteen new video gaming licenses
21	were issued during July 2014: Nine bars
22	and seven restaurants. Six new
23	applications were received by the Gaming
24	Enforcement Division during July and are
25	currently pending in the field: Four
	12
1	bars and two restaurants. The gaming
2	Enforcement Division assessed \$4,250 and
3	collected \$10,500 in penalties in July,
4	and there are currently no outstanding
5	fines. Please refer to page two of your
6	handout.
7	There are presently 14,141 video
8	gaming devices activated at 1,934
9	locations. Net device revenue for
10	July 2014 was \$47.7 million, a \$600,000
11	decrease, or 1.2 percent, when compared

12	to net device revenue for June 2014, and
13	a \$35,000 increase, or one-tenth of
14	1 percent, when compared to July 2013.
15	Net device revenue so far for fiscal
16	year 2015 is \$47.7 million, a \$35,000
17	increase or one-tenth of 1 percent when
18	compared to net device revenue for
19	fiscal year 2014. Page three of your
20	handout shows a comparison of net device
21	revenue.
22	Total franchise fees collected for
23	July 2014 were \$14.3 million, a \$200,000
24	decrease when compared to June 2014, and
25	a \$50,000 increase when compared to
	13
1	July 2013. Total franchise fees
2	collected for fiscal year 2014 excuse
3	me, fiscal year 2015 are \$14.3 million,
4	a \$50,000 increase or four-tenths of
5	1 percent when compared to franchise
6	fees for fiscal year 2014.
7	Page four of your handout shows a
8	comparison of franchise fees. Does
9	anybody have any questions?
10	CHAIRMAN JONES: Board Members?
11	There are none.
12	MR. BOSSIER: Thank you.
13	CHAIRMAN JONES: Thank you, Jim.
14	V. COMPLIANCE REPORTS

15	CHAIRMAN JONES: At this point, we'd
16	like to take up Compliance Reports.
17	MS. BROWN: Good morning. Good
18	morning, Chairman Jones, Board Members.
19	I'm Mesa Brown, Assistant Attorney
20	General, and I'll be presenting the
21	staff reports on riverboat casino and
22	racetrack casino licensees' compliance
23	with employment and procurement
24	conditions for the second quarter of
25	2014.
	14
1	The second quarter reports are taken
2	from figures reported by the 14 of the
3	15 operating riverboats to the Louisiana
4	Gaming Control Board. Overall totals in
5	the second quarter of 2014:
6	Approximately 13,311 people were
7	employed by the riverboat industry. Of
8	that number, 13,155 were Louisiana
9	residents; 8,498 were minorities, and
10	7,662 were women. Five licensees
11	achieved total compliance in the second
12	quarter of 2014. They are as follows:
13	Sam's Town Hotel & Casino, L'Auberge
14	Casino & Hotel Baton Rouge, Hollywood
15	Casino, Eldorado Resort Shreveport, and
16	L'Auberge Casino & Resort Lake Charles.
17	Under total employment: Two

17 Under total employment: Two

18	licensees did not meet total employment
19	goals, and they are DiamondJacks Casino
20	and Resort, who achieved 639 out of a
21	goal of 650. Boomtown Casino Bossier
22	achieved 623 out of a goal of 650.
23	Employment categories: All
24	licensees with the exception of Treasure
25	Chest Casino either met or exceeded
	15
1	their voluntary conditions in all of the
2	subcategories under the main category of
3	employment. Treasure Chest did not
4	achieve its female employment goal. It
5	achieved 49.4 out of a goal of
6	51.86 percent.
7	Procurement: The licensees are
8	grouped according to three subcategories
9	which appear in your report. They are
10	Louisiana, minority and female
11	procurement. Louisiana procurement:
12	Three licensees failed to meet the
13	Louisiana procurement goals, and they
14	are Horseshoe Casino & Hotel, who
15	achieved 69.4 out of a goal of
16	75 percent; Boomtown New Orleans
17	achieved 79.2 out of 80 percent, and
18	Margaritaville Resort Casino achieved
19	81.1 out of a goal of 90 percent.
20	Minority procurement: Six licensees

21	did not achieve minority procurement
22	goals, and they are Horseshoe Casino &
23	Hotel who achieved 9 out of a goal of
24	35 percent; Belle of Baton Rouge Casino
25	achieved 14 out of a goal of 15 percent;
	16
1	Treasure Chest Casino achieved 4.4 out
2	of a goal of 15 percent; Amelia Belle
3	Casino, 17.1 out of a goal of
4	30 percent; and Isle of Capri Casino St.
5	Charles achieved 6.8 out of a goal of
6	10; Margaritaville Resort Casino
7	achieved 7.1 out of a goal of
8	10 percent.
9	Female procurement: One licensee
10	did not achieve its female procurement
11	goals, and that licensee is Horseshoe
12	Casino & Hotel who achieved 27.9 out of
13	a goal of 35 percent. Are there any
14	questions regarding the riverboat
15	casinos?
16	CHAIRMAN JONES: Board members on
17	riverboats? The Board is clear.
18	MS. BROWN: Okay. Well, I'll
19	proceed with racetrack casinos. In the
20	second quarter of 2014, approximately
21	2,022 people were employed by the
22	racetrack casino industry. Of that
23	number, 1,740 were Louisiana residents,

24	1,111 were minorities, and 1,203 were

2	Fairgrounds achieved total compliance.
3	The other two racetrack casinos fell
4	short of their employment goals. Delta

8	Louisiana Downs did not achieve its
9	female employment goal. It achieved
10	59.8 out of 60 percent.

21	2. L.M. Daigle Oil Co., Inc., d/b/a Starks
22	Truck Stop - No. 1000516060 (transfer of
23	interest)
24	CHAIRMAN JONES: We now move to
25	video gaming issues. We have

1	consideration of the following truckstop
2	applications. We're going to take them
3	jointly, consideration of the transfer
4	of interest in the following two
5	licenses: L.M. Daigle Oil, Co., doing
6	business as Lucky Delta. That's No.
7	1006500040. That's a transfer of
8	interest to be considered jointly with
9	L.M. Daigle Oil, Co., Inc., doing
10	business as Starks Truckstop, No.
11	1000516060, also a transfer of interest.
12	Good morning.
13	MS. COLLY: Good morning, Chairman
14	Jones, Members of the Board. I am
15	Assistant Attorney General, Nicolette
16	Colly, appearing before the Board on the
17	matter of a transfer of stock in L.M.
18	Daigle Oil, Co., Inc. L.M. Daigle holds
19	two truckstop licenses: Starks Truck
20	Stop and Lucky Delta.
21	Starks Truck Stop is located a 4344
22	Highway 12, Starks, Louisiana, and Lucky
23	Delta is located 1907 West Street,
24	Vinton, Louisiana.
25	On April 28th, 2014, Harry Shaheen,
	19
1	Jr., the holder of 100 percent of the
2	ownership in L.M. Daigle, transferred
3	all of his stock interest in the

4	licensee to Fleur de Lis Truckstops,
5	LLC. Fleur de Lis Truckstops is owned
6	50/50 by John Gottardi and Anthony
7	Cashiola, Jr. John Gottardi was elected
8	President; Anthony Cashiola, Jr., was
9	elected Vice-President and Jerry
10	Gottardi was elected Secretary of L.M.
11	Daigle.
12	Trooper Vincent Lenguyen has
13	conducted a suitability investigation of
14	the relevant persons associated with the
15	transfer. He is present this morning to
16	report his findings to the Board.
17	TROOPER LENGUYEN: Good morning,
18	Chairman Jones and Board Members. My
19	name is Trooper Vincent Lenguyen with
20	Louisiana State Police Gaming
21	Enforcement Division.
22	I conducted the investigation of the
23	transfer of stocks interest by Harry
24	Shaheen, Jr., to Fleur de Lis Truckstop,
25	LLC. An updated criminal history
	20
1	inquiry was conducted on John Gottardi,
2	Anthony Cashioli, Jr., Kim Cashioli and
3	Jerry Gottardi who have previously met
4	suitability under several active video
5	gaming licenses. I also conducted a
6	background investigation on Lorraine

7	Gottardi. Miss Gottardi is the spouse
8	of John Gottardi. This is the first
9	time Miss Gottardi was required to
10	submit to suitability investigation.
11	My investigation revealed no
12	information that would preclude a
13	finding of suitability for John
14	Gottardi, Anthony Cashioli, Jr., Kim
15	Cashioli, Jerry Gottardi and Lorraine
16	Gottardi. I also did not find any
17	information that would preclude the
18	licensee from continuing to participate
19	in the video gaming industry.
20	I'll be happy to answer any question
21	that you have at this time.
22	CHAIRMAN JONES: Does this Board
23	have any questions for the Attorney
24	General's Office or State Police? The
25	Board appears to be clear.
	21
1	MS. COLLY: The Office of the
2	Attorney General has reviewed the file
3	compiled as a result of the
4	investigation, and our review indicates
5	that no information was found that would
6	preclude the continued licensing of L.M.
7	Daigle Oil Co., Inc., d/b/a Starks Truck
8	Stop and L.M. Daigle Oil Co., Inc.,
9	d/b/a Lucky Delta.

10	CHAIRMAN JONES: Do I have a motion

20	A. Consideration of Certificate of Compliance
21	for the Alternate Riverboat Inspection of

23	Partnership d/b/a L'Auberge Casino & Hotel
24	Baton Rouge - No. R011000801
25	CHAIRMAN JONES: We then move to
	22
1	Casino Gaming Issues. First up:
2	Consideration of Certificate of
3	Compliance for the Alternate Riverboat
4	Inspection of the gaming vessel PNK
5	(Baton Rouge) Partnership doing business
6	as L'Auberge Casino & Hotel Baton Rouge.
7	That's No. R011000801. Good morning.
8	MR. TYLER: Good morning, Chairman
9	Jones, Board Members, Assistant Attorney
10	General, Michael Tyler. Today I'm
11	joined by Walt Hanson of the American
12	Bureau of Shipping Consultants, also

13	known as ABSC. We come before you this
14	morning with respect to the issuance of
15	the renewal Certificate of Compliance
16	for L'Auberge Baton Rouge Casino.
17	On July 15th, 2014, L'Auberge Baton
18	Rouge Casino started the process for the
19	renewal of its Certificate of
20	Compliance. For more on that, I now
21	turn this matter over to Walt Hanson of
22	ABSC.
23	MR. HANSON: Good morning, Chairman
24	and Board Members.
25	CHAIRMAN JONES: Good morning.
	23
1	MR. HANSON: I'm Walt Hanson with
2	ABS Consulting here to report the annual
3	certification of L'Auberge Baton Rouge
4	Casino.
5	The surveyors, Jeff Boyle and
6	Lindsey Dew, did on July 15th and 16th
7	attend the L'Auberge Baton Rouge Casino
8	to conduct an annual inspected [sic] in
9	accordance with the alternative
10	inspection program in the State of
11	Louisiana. These surveyors reviewed
12	fire protection equipment, life-saving
13	equipment, egress routes, mooring
14	system, training records and conducted a
15	fire drill. There were some minor items

16	noted, but all were correct before the
17	surveyors departed the facility.
18	Therefore, the 2014 annual survey,
19	as required by Louisiana Gaming Control
20	Board, is complete and presents no
21	safety concerns to its patrons or
22	employees on the riverboat. It is the
23	recommendation of ABSC that L'Auberge
24	Baton Rouge Casino be issued the
25	Certificate of Compliance.
	24
1	MR. TYLER: We now present these
2	findings to this honorable board and
3	request that upon the Board accepting
4	the report submitted by ABSC, that the
5	Board will move for L'Auberge Baton
6	Rouge Casino to receive the renewal of
7	its Certificate of Compliance.
8	CHAIRMAN JONES: Do I have a motion?
9	MR. BRADFORD: So moved.
10	CHAIRMAN JONES: By Mr. Bradford, a
11	second by
12	MR. SINGLETON: Second.
13	CHAIRMAN JONES: Mr. Singleton.
14	All in favor? [Collective "aye."] Any
15	opposed? [No response.] Motion
16	carries. Thank you, gentlemen.
17	MR. TYLER: Thank you.
18	B. Consideration of renewal application for

22	CHAIRMAN JONES: That brings us now
23	to: Consideration of renewal
24	application for riverboat gaming license
25	of Eldorado Casino Shreveport Joint
	25
1	Venture doing business as Eldorado
2	Resort Casino Shreveport, No.
3	RO13600005.
4	Good morning.
5	MS. HIMEL: Good morning, Chairman
6	Jones and Members of the Board. I'm
7	Assistant Attorney General, Dawn Himel.
8	With me are auditor Evie Ficklin and
9	Trooper Eddie Daigle. Representatives
10	of Eldorado are also present today.
11	As you stated, we're here in the
12	matter of the renewal of the riverboat
13	license of Eldorado Casino Shreveport
14	Joint Venture doing business as Eldorado
15	Resort Casino Shreveport located in
16	Bossier City, Louisiana.
17	Riverboat licenses are issued for
18	five-year terms, and this license is due
19	to expire on October 14th, 2014. As
20	part of this renewal process, our office
21	worked with the attorney for the

riverboat gaming license of Eldorado Casino

19

22	licensee to renew their conditions. The
23	current statement of conditions is from
24	1998. It references the previous name
25	of the licensee, which was Queen of New
	26
1	Orleans.
2	There were other conditions that
3	were imposed through resolutions in
4	2005, and 2011 they had new conditions.
5	So all of those needed to be
6	consolidated and updated. A lot of
7	those conditions included, you know,
8	building escrow, talked about previous
9	transfers that have already occurred,
10	those sort of things. Any conditions
11	that were completed or satisfied were
12	also removed from the conditions. Some
13	substantive changes were made, but other
14	than that it was just some editing.
15	The licensee has agreed to be bound
16	by the conditions, and a proposed
17	resolution subject to those conditions
18	has been provided to the Board, if you
19	so choose to approve the renewal.
20	And at this time, Evie Ficklin would
21	present her findings for the audit, and
22	then Eddie Daigle will present the
23	suitability findings.
24	MS. FICKLIN: Good morning,

25	Mr. Chairman and Board Members. I'm
	27
1	Evie Ficklin, a gaming auditor with
2	Louisiana State Police.
3	Eldorado Shreveport's projected
4	pre-cash flow schedule is shown on page
5	13, and it includes projected amounts
6	for management fees and capital
7	expenditures. The licensee projects
8	\$4 million to be spent annually on
9	capital expenditures. Eldorado
10	management anticipates the capital
11	expenditures will be maintenance capex.
12	Also, on page 13 is a schedule of
13	Eldorado Shreveport's capital
14	expenditures since 2009. Eldorado
15	Shreveport projects to pay \$3 million
16	annually to Eldorado Resorts in
17	management fees pursuant to the
18	administrative and support services
19	agreement effective June 2011. Eldorado
20	Resorts supervises and directs all
21	day-to-day administrative services for
22	\$250,000 monthly.
23	Eldorado Shreveport leases its hotel
24	casino site pursuant to the ground lease
25	agreement with the City of Shreveport.
	20

1 The ground lease is a 50-year lease

2	comprised of an initial ten-year term
3	and eight five-year renewal terms.
4	Subsequent to the initial ten-year term,
5	the ground lease requires the licensee
6	to pay the City of Shreveport a
7	beginning base rent of \$402,500 annually
8	in the initial five-year renewal term.
9	The base rent thereafter increases by
10	15 percent in each succeeding five-year
11	renewal term through the fifth five-year
12	renewal. The licensee also pays the
13	city a percentage rental amount based,
14	in part, Eldorado Shreveport's adjusted
15	gross revenues.
16	Other payments required under the
17	1999 ground lease include fees paid to
18	the City of Shreveport and the Bossier
19	Parish School Board in lieu of admission
20	fees allowed under the gaming statute.
21	Eldorado Shreveport also makes payments
22	to the Bossier Parish Police Jury
23	pursuant to the 2005 settlement
24	agreement. A schedule of Eldorado
25	Shreveport's payments to Shreveport and
	29
1	to the Bossier Parish School Board and
2	police jury is shown on page 19.
3	Eldorado Casino Shreveport competes
4	in the Shreveport/Bossier City gaming

5	market with the casino, Harrah's
6	Louisiana Downs, and with five other
7	riverboats including Margaritaville
8	Resort Casino that opened in June 2013.
9	A comparison of the adjusted gross
10	revenues of the riverboats operating in
11	the Shreveport/Bossier City gaming
12	market is shown on page 16 of our
13	report.
14	Outside of its local competition,
15	Eldorado Shreveport also competes with
16	tribal casinos in Oklahoma for patrons
17	from the Dallas Fort Worth area. The
18	largest of these Indian Casinos is
19	WinStar in Thackerville, Oklahoma, whose
20	operations include 500,000 square feet
21	of gaming space. WinStar opened in
22	August 2003 and is approximately
23	60 miles from Dallas Fort Worth as
24	compared to Eldorado Shreveport at
25	185 miles.
	30
1	Eldorado Shreveport is party to a
2	September 2013 agreement and plan of
3	merger with MTR Gaming Group, Inc. The
4	Board approved the merger June 19th,
5	2014. All required jurisdictions, with
6	the exception of the Pennsylvania

7 regulators, have previously approved the

8	transaction. Pending a special meeting,

12	officer upheld the immediate emergency
13	suspension of Ciro Mussle as a result of
14	his arrest for theft of the \$25 from the
15	casino where he was employed. Now,
16	Mr. Mussle alleges that this \$25 came
17	from tips, but in reality the \$25 was
18	part of a \$42 total taken from the
19	previous shift's bank; and since the
20	bank was counted at the beginning of the
21	shift, the \$42 was most likely an
22	overage.
23	If an overage is discovered, the
24	property procedure is for a manager to

be called over, paperwork is generated,

	50
1	and that gives rise to an investigation
2	that will trace back the source of the
3	overage.
4	In this case what happened was that
5	Mr. Mussle took the \$42 overage. It was
6	placed on the counter under a computer
7	monitor at 1:34 a.m. in the morning. At
8	4:53 in the morning, he retrieved the
9	\$42. He placed \$17 in a dealer's tip
10	box, and he pocketed a \$25 chip.
11	Now, even if the \$25 had come from
12	the tips, in the highly regulated
13	environment of the casino, at no time
14	would any participant in a table game
15	any personnel from a table game be
16	simply allowed to pocket a tip. Tips
17	are treated as taxable income. They're
18	placed in clear plastic boxes. At the
19	end of the shift, they're take to a
20	cage. The cage totals the tip amount.
21	That verified amount is added to the
22	employee's payroll check.
23	It's important to note, too, that on
24	the particular day when this happened,
25	Mr. Mussle was acting as a casino poker
	57

1 supervisor. Supervisors are not

2	eligible to receive tips at all.
3	So Mr. Mussle's action in pocketing
4	the chip was such at variance with
5	casino policy that the casino itself
6	initiated the investigation which gave
7	rise to his arrest.
8	Gaming is a highly regulated
9	industry, and because the competence of
10	the patrons and the assets of the casino
11	and of the state are in the hands of the
12	employees, they're very careful about
13	this.
14	Mr. Mussle's non-key employee permit
15	was revoked by order of the hearing
16	officer on June 30th. The hearing
17	officer correctly found that as of that
18	date, which was four months after the
19	emergency suspension hearing, there were
20	pending theft charges against
21	Mr. Mussle, which in and of itself is a
22	statutory bar to participation in
23	gaming.
24	However, in his reasons for
25	decision, the hearing officer stated the
	58
1	following: Mr. Mussle was interviewed
2	by agents of Louisiana State Police, and
3	after being advised of his Miranda
4	rights admitted to theft of the check,

5	which is a chip, in the amount of \$25 at
6	L'Auberge Casino where he was employed.
7	Mr. Mussle was arrested and charged
8	with violating Louisiana Revised Statute
9	14:67(B)(3), which is theft. By citing
10	Mr. Muscle's admission of unlawfully
11	taking the chip, the hearing officer is
12	showing that he took into account the
13	general suitability of the permittee as
14	well as the pending charges. The gaming
15	suitability statue states that gaming
16	employees must have good character,
17	honesty and integrity to continue as
18	gaming permittees. These are threshold
19	suitability standards, almost the
20	minimum that's required of somebody
21	who's in any position of authority in
22	the gaming arena. When the hearing
23	officer weighed these considerations
24	before he correctly issued the order to
25	revoked his permit.
	59
1	Now, Mr. Mussle requested this
2	appeal based on the East Baton Rouge
3	DA's dismissal of the theft charges on
4	July 9th, which occurred after the
5	revocation hearing, and it's possible
6	that to a D A of a major metropolitan

6 that to a D.A. of a major metropolitan

7 area, a \$25 chip, that does not seem

8	like a significant crime. But the fact
9	is that Mr. Mussle took this chip in his
10	position as a casino poker supervisor, a
11	position in which he should not even
12	have been receiving tips, but most
13	importantly a position that requires
14	trust and scrupulous honesty because of
15	the vast amounts of money that pass
16	through his hands on a daily basis.
17	Mr. Mussle betrayed this trust placed in
18	him as a casino employee, and the fact
19	that he was caught doing this action
20	cast doubts on both his past and future
21	actions.
22	There is a strict and clear legal
23	procedure laid out by gaming law to be
24	followed in cases where permittees are
25	arrested and this may lead to a
	60
1	revocation. This procedure was
2	followed. The law was applied
3	impartially, and the result was a
4	revocation of his permit.
5	Mr. Mussle may seek to have the
6	D.A.'s document looked at in the form of
7	a remand, but that's usually used to
8	present new evidence which may change
9	the perception of the original facts.
10	In this case, the D.A.'s dismissal is

11	relevant is irrelevant. I'm sorry.
12	It has no bearing at all because it
13	doesn't undue the fact that the chip was
14	unlawfully taken, and he admitted to
15	taking the chip.
16	There's semantical differences as to
17	whether that was theft or not. He
18	admitted to taking the chip, does not
19	dispute the fact that he took the chip.
20	So the D.A.'s dismissal is doesn't
21	count here because the taking of the
22	chip is the action that betrayed the
23	trust of the employer and renders
24	Mr. Mussle unsuitable to work in this
25	industry.
	61
1	So I urge the Board to uphold the
2	hearing officer's decision to revoke the
3	non-key gaming permit of Mr. Ciro
4	Mussle.
5	MR. MUSSLE: Can I refute this?
6	When I came in, I came in at 1:30. The
7	room had gone dark. There was no more
8	games at 11:00. The bank was already
9	situated. It stays at 31,000. The
10	shift manager that I took over from,
11	Terry Falcon, had tried to testify on
12	numerous occasions that it was a \$41
13	overage in the bank.

CHAIRMAN JONES: You can't speak for
anyone else, sir, okay?
MR. MUSSLE: Well, I brought an
affidavit, but I guess
CHAIRMAN JONES: That should have
been presented at your original hearing.
MR. MUSSLE: I went to the original
hearing, and they told me that State
Police told me that no one ever comes
to these hearings, and then they
scheduled another hearing which I had to
wait for the outcome of my trial.

CHAIRMAN JONES: You were afforded a
hearing, weren't you?
MR. MUSSLE: Sir, I guess y'all have
made up your minds.
CHAIRMAN JONES: Mr. Mussle, excuse
me. Were you afforded a hearing?
MR. MUSSLE: I suppose so, yes, sir,
but the hearing that I was afforded was
told it was based on the outcome of my
trial on July 7th, which was past the
original hearing. I never had a trial.
My trial was dismissed.
CHAIRMAN JONES: We can't we can
not consider that. Let me just
MR. MUSSLE: I hate to step on you.
I'd just like to get what I have to say

 18 want. 19 I have 24 years in the gaming 20 casino. I have a sterling record. I 21 don't want to end my career as a thief, 22 especially for a \$25 chip. This was a 23 tip. I have a person who says he 24 accrued the tips and passed them on to 25 me. If that puts me out of the casino, 63 1 then y'all can do what you deem 2 necessary. 3 CHAIRMAN JONES: Are there any 4 questions from the Board? 5 MR. BRADFORD: You know, every once 6 in a while I go off on a wild hair, but 7 I'm going to move to remand; and I may 8 lose this vote, but I'm going to do it 9 anyway. So that's my motion. 10 MR. 2	MAJOR MERCER: Didn't I read where
3	you had completed a pretrial diversion
4	program?
5	MR. MUSSLE: Yes, sir.
6	MAJOR MERCER: Is that right?

25	Police who did the investigation are

2	MR. MUSSLE: The original

3	CHAIRMAN JONES: Is that's your
4	position?
5	MR. MUSSLE: Yes, sir. The original
6	State Policeman had arrested me before
7	he really knew my name.
8	CHAIRMAN JONES: Mr. Mussle, please.
9	We have everything in the record, okay?
10	MR. MUSSLE: Okay.
11	CHAIRMAN JONES: Any other
12	questions? We have a motion,
13	Mr. Bradford, to remand. Is there a
