

### LOUISIANA GAMING CONTROL BOARD REPORT TO THE LOUISIANA STATE LEGISLATURE 1999-2000

### Mr. President, Mr. Speaker and Members of the Louisiana Legislature

This annual report to you, in response to legislative mandate La. R.S. 27:15(b), is a reflection of events and compilation of data as the Louisiana Gaming Control Board nears completion of its first four years. The past twelve months have been unusually active as the multi-faceted gaming industry underwent many changes.

Video poker operations were eliminated in thirty-three parishes. Preliminary reports indicate that, while the number of outlets and machines have remained constant, the revenues to state and local government have decreased by almost one-third. This would indicate that the movement to other less populated parishes will not maintain past revenues.

The landbased casino (Harrah's) has opened in New Orleans. As a consequence, the workload of the Board, State Police and the Attorney General consumed several thousand man-hours. Extensive suitability studies of entities seeking licenses and permits were conducted by State Police. Contractual arrangements requiring Board certification were researched by the Attorney General's legal staff. Rules and regulations were put in place dealing with the conduct of gaming, financial procedures, and general administration matters. The daily cash transfer of approximately \$275,000 has been operative since November 1, 1999. At this point, it is of interest to note that Michigan has become the fourth state to adopt casino gaming. There are now three (non-Indian) legally authorized landbased casinos in the Detroit area. Further information is included in another section of this report.

As a result of legislative action slot machines will become operative at two racetracks. A third has received local approval but will require legislative action to set up a local taxing authority. Here again, much time has been spent in the creation of rules and regulations, preparing for on-site supervision and creation of the tax structure. Louisiana is not alone in this effort since the states of Iowa, Delaware, West Virginia, and Rhode Island have approved legislation allowing slot machines at racetracks.

The riverboat gaming segment has been both active and volatile. Board clearance and approval of financial arrangements have been received by the Hollywood Partners group for a Shreveport project. Boat construction is underway and land is being cleared in preparation for a hotel and other amenities. Their license originated as the award to the "Hilton" group in New Orleans and subsequently transferred to Caddo Parish. In addition, Harrah's (Shreveport) has begun construction of a hotel adjacent to its vessel. Both projects, according to Caddo Parish officials, will create in excess of 2,500 on-site jobs and add millions of dollars to the local economy.

Major changes will occur in Lake Charles as a result of actions taken with reference to Players International who operate two vessels in the area. They have agreed to make payment of \$10,200,000, to the state, leave the state and sell their properties. This is the result of allegations surrounding the granting of the initial license. Harrah's Entertainment is the proposed purchaser. The settlement avoids a probable long and costly legal battle for the state to regain the licenses during which time the facility would likely continue to operate. Since current powers granted the Board to deal with such matters are conducive to protracted litigation, the regulators felt it was in the state's best interest to ensure the departure of the current owners with a severe penalty. A potential outcome of the decision is prospective new management willing to make major improvements to the facility. From an economic viewpoint, the decision was endorsed by the area governmental and business leaders who feared the effect of the loss of thousands of jobs and millions in revenue

The Board wishes to express public appreciation for the assistance rendered by special counsel from the Office of the Attorney General. Ray Lamonica, Professor of Law at Louisiana State University and a former United States Attorney for this area, provided excellent advice and leadership in the process.

Still under consideration is the matter of the fifteenth license. Other than acknowledgment of receipt of applications, no definitive Board action has been taken.

During the past year, a cost/benefit analysis of gambling in Louisiana was presented to the legislature. The study was conducted by a multi-campus research team headed by the University of New Orleans. At almost the same time, the report of the National Gaming Impact Study Commission was made public. Both findings were almost identical and predictable. Briefly stated, they related that while the dollar value in respect to the economy exceeded the social costs, the latter effect was sufficiently evident to warrant future consideration. Although the incidence of underage gambling could be minimized by constant vigilance, problem and compulsive gaming was more difficult to address. While other states expressed some concern about the problem, Louisiana is the only state that actually finances both an education and treatment program. The Board will continue to study, evaluate and encourage efforts to contain the problem. This activity has a high ranking in its goals and objectives program. A coalition of the gaming industry, State Police and the Department of Health and Hospitals, with directives and suggestions by the Board, will coordinate efforts to identify, counsel and treat those afflicted.

The operating budget in the current year was \$1,265,195. The request for next year is approximately 2% higher. The growth during the first four years has been minimal despite the increased responsibilities associated with a growing industry. The largest area of expense is associated with the cost of Hearing Officers and Court Reporters (\$302,000). Since the Board has a mandate to comply with the Administrative Procedure Act, we must hold hearings when sanctions are levied against licensees and permit holders and appeals are made. The largest single expenditure (\$118,000) other than compensation for staff and Board members is for potential exposure as assessed by the Office of Risk Management. It has been and will continue to be a Board practice to exercise prudent fiscal management and return a surplus each year.

The Gaming Control Board is actively examining the drafting of a series of proposals to the legislature to strengthen its ability to regulate gaming activities. Under consideration are matters dealing with fines and penalties, judicial processes and changes in the staffing pattern and duties of the Board itself. Discussion is constantly ongoing with other gaming jurisdictions as part of our normal, information exchange program. It is Board intent to work in concert with the legislature on proposals to further develop and strengthen the framework under which it operates.

Finally, we wish to ensure that gaming in Louisiana will be regulated in a manner that will promote the best interest of the state, afford the maximum protection of participants, and insure that the industry is free of corrupting influences.



### Use of Funds

New Jersey law requires that the state tax, 8% of casino adjusted gross revenue, shall be used for programs aiding senior citizens and the disabled, specifically including a pharmaceutical drug assistance program, a program allowing an annual credit of up to two hundred twenty-five dollars (\$225) toward utility costs, a transportation assistance program and others.

The reinvestment projects, 1.25% of adjusted gross revenue, have been used for developing approximately two thousand (2000) housing units in Atlantic City, parks, beautification programs, agricultural loan programs, a Vietnam Veteran Memorial and others.



### **NEVADA**

Legalized gaming has been conducted in Nevada since 1931. At the end of FY 1998-1999 there were over two hundred and five thousand (205,000) slot machines in the state, almost six thousand (6,000) table games and over five hundred (500) poker tables. Nevada's tax structure is complex consisting of game and device taxes, quarterly license fees on games and devices, annual license fees and a monthly percentage fee for non-restricted gaming operations (over 15 slot machines) of:

- 3% of the first \$ 50,000, plus
- 4% of the next \$ 84,000, plus
- 6 \_ % of revenue exceeding \$ 134, 000.

### **USE OF FUNDS**

Michigan statutory provisions allow imposition of an 18% tax on adjusted gross revenues, 55% of which or 9.9% of AGR goes to the city for use in connection with:

- 1. The hiring, training and deployment of street patrol officers.
- 2. Neighborhood and downtown economic development programs designed to create local jobs.
- 3. Public safety programs such as emergency medical services fire department programs and street lighting.
- 4. Anti-gang and youth development programs.
- 5. Other programs that are designed to contribute to the improvement of the quality of life in the city.
- 6. Relief to the taxpayers of the city from one of more taxes or fees imposed by the city.
- 7. The costs of capitol improvements.
- 8. Road repairs and improvements.

8.1% of AGR is to be used by the state for deposit in the school aid fund to provide additional funds for K-12 classroom education.

### LIVE RACING FACILITY PARI-MUTUEL SLOT MACHINE GAMING

### **LOUISIANA**

By Act 721 of the 1997 Regular Session, the Legislature authorized slot machine gaming at live horse racing facilities in St. Landry, Bossier and Calcasieu Parishes, contingent upon local voter approval and taxing provisions. Act 307 of the 1999 Regular Session created taxing districts in St. Landry and Bossier Parishes to facilitate collection of revenues for the state.


Slot machine gaming at horse race tracks in these parishes is expected to commence by the end of calendar year 2000.

### **OTHER STATES**

### **WEST VIRGINIA**

Slot machine or video lottery gaming is conducted at two (2) horse tracks in West Virginia. The West Virginia Lottery determines which machines will be placed in operation, which are owned or leased by the tracks. All machine revenues are swept 5 days per week. From Gross Terminal Revenue, 4% is deducted for costs of administration. A total of three thousand three hundred eighty one (3,381) terminals or devices were in operation at the end of FY 1998-1999. 


### RHODE ISLAND

In Rhode Island, slot machine or video lottery gaming is conducted at one pari-mutuel dog track and one pari-mutuel jai alai fronton. 
