2 IV. REVENUE REPORTS

3	CHAIRMAN JONES: First up is Revenue	
4	Reports. Good morning.	
5	MR. BOSSIER: Morning.	
6	Good morning, Chairman Jones and	
7	Board Members. My name is Jim Bossier	
8	with Louisiana State Police Gaming	
9	Enforcement Division. The riverboat	
10	revenue report for July 2016 is shown on	
11	page one of your handout.	
12	During July, the 15 operating	
13	riverboats generated Adjusted Gross	
14	Receipts of \$178,183,983. This total	
15	represents an increase of \$21.8 million	
16	or 13.9 percent from last month.	
17	Compared to July 2015, revenues	
18	decreased almost \$1.8 million or	
19	1 percent. Historically, July revenues	
20	are higher than June. In addition, July	
21	included five full weekends. During	
22	July, the first month of the fiscal	
23	year, the State collected fees totaling	
24	\$38,309,556.	
25	Next is a summary of the July 2016	
	8	
1	gaming activity for Harrah's New Orleans	
2	found on page three. During July,	
3	Harrah's generated \$22,450,804 in gross	
4	gaming revenue, up almost \$3 million or	
5	15.4 percent from June. Compared to	

6	July 2015, Harrah's revenues decreased
-	42 F 'II' 27 C

- 7 13.5 million or 37.6 percent. Because
- 8 we noted the unusually high single day
- 9 win in July 2015, we also want to
- 10 mention that day created the majority of
- the difference between 2015 and 2016.
- Without that win, July 2016 revenues
- would still be down from 2015 by about
- 14 6 percent. During July, the State
- received \$5,095,890 in minimum daily
- 16 payments.
- 17 Next I'll present the revenues for
- 18 Slots at the Racetrack. During July,
- 19 the four racetrack facilities combined
- 20 generated Adjusted Gross Receipts of
- 21 \$30,646,604, an increase of almost
- \$3.8 million or 14 percent from June.
- 23 Compared to July 2015, revenues
- decreased \$1.7 million or 5.3 percent.
- 25 During July, the State collected fees

- 1 totaling \$4,649,090.
- 2 Overall, Riverboats, Landbased and
- 3 Slots at the Racetracks combined
- 4 generated \$231 million in Adjusted Gross
- 5 Receipts and \$48 million in state fees.
- 6 These figures represent a decrease in
- 7 July 2015 of about 6.7 percent.
- 8 Are there any questions about casino

9	revenues before I present the Harrah's
10	employee numbers?
11	CHAIRMAN JONES: Board Members, any
12	questions? [No response.] You may
13	proceed.
14	MR. BOSSIER: Harrah's New Orleans
15	is required to maintain at least 2,400
16	employees and a bi-weekly payroll of
17	\$1,750,835. This report covers two pay
18	periods in July 2016.
19	For the first pay period, the
20	Division verified 2,464 employees with a
21	payroll of \$1,843,000. For the second
22	pay period, the Division verified 2,454
23	employees with a payroll of \$1,807,000.
24	Therefore, Harrah's met the employment
25	criteria during the month of July.
	10
1	Are there any questions before I
2	proceed to video gaming statistics?
3	CHAIRMAN JONES: Any questions? No
4	questions.
5	MR. BOSSIER: Twenty-three new video
6	gaming licenses were issued during July:
7	Ten bars, twelve restaurants and one
8	device owner. Four new applications
9	were received by the Gaming Enforcement
10	Division during July and are currently
11	pending in the field: Two restaurants

12	and two truckstops.
13	The Gaming Enforcement Division
14	assessed \$2,000 and collected \$3,000 in
15	fines during July, and there are
16	currently \$1,250 in outstanding fines.
17	Please refer to page two of your
18	handout.
19	There are presently 13,046 video
20	gaming devices activated at 1,786
21	locations.
22	Net device revenue for July 2016 was
23	\$46.2 million, an \$800,000 increase, or
24	1.8 percent, when compared to June 2016,
25	and a \$2.4 million decrease, or
	11
1	4.9 percent, when compared to July 2015.
2	Net device revenue so far for fiscal
3	year 2016 is \$46.2 million, a
4	\$2.4 million decrease, or 4.9 percent,
5	when compared to fiscal year 2015. Page
6	three of your handout shows a comparison
7	of net device revenue.
8	Total franchise fees collected for
9	July 2016 were \$13.8 million, a \$200,000
10	increase when compared to June and a
11	\$700,000 decrease when compared to
12	July 2015.
13	Total franchise fees collected for
14	fiscal year 2016 are \$13.8 million, a

15	\$700,000 decrease, or 4.8 percent, when
16	compared to fiscal year 2015.
17	Page four of your handout shows a
18	comparison of franchise fees. Does
19	anybody have any questions?
20	CHAIRMAN JONES: Any questions,
21	Board Members? There are no questions.
22	MR. BOSSIER: Thank you.
23	CHAIRMAN JONES: Thank you very
24	much.
25	V. COMPLIANCE REPORTS
	12
1	CHAIRMAN JONES: I'll now call for
2	Compliance Reports. Good morning.
3	MS. BROWN: Good morning.
4	Good morning, Chairman Jones, Board
5	Members. I'm Mesa Brown Assistant
6	Attorney General.
7	Today I'll present the staff reports
8	on riverboat racetrack casino licensees'
9	compliance with employment and
10	procurement conditions for the second
11	quarter of 2016. I'll begin with
12	riverboats.
13	The second quarter reports are taken
14	from figures reported by the 15
15	operating riverboats to the Louisiana
16	Gaming Control Board. In the second
17	quarter of 2016, approximately 14,536

18	people were employed by the riverboat	
19	industry. Of that number, 14,201 were	
20	Louisiana residents, 9,579 were	
21	minorities and 8,294 were women.	
22	Four licensees achieved total	
23	compliance this quarter, and they are:	
24	L'Auberge Casino & Hotel Baton Rouge,	
25	Golden Nugget, Belle of Baton Rouge	
	13	
1	Casino and Isle of Capri Casino St.	
2	Charles.	
3	Next I'll address employment. Four	
4	licensees did not meet their total	
5	employment goals. They are DiamondJacks	
6	Casino & Resort, who achieved 531 out of	
7	a goal of 650; Hollywood achieved 440	
8	out of a goal of 450; Boomtown Casino	
9	Bossier achieved 549 out of 650, and	
10	Eldorado Resort Shreveport achieved	
11	1,146 out of 1,200. All licensees	
12	either met or exceeded their goals in	
13	all of the subcategories under the main	
14	category of employment.	
15	Next I'll address procurement. The	
16	licensees are grouped according to three	
17	subcategories which appear in your	
18	report. They are Louisiana, minority	
19	and female procurement.	
20	Under Louisiana procurement, two	

21	licensee did not achieve compliance with
22	its voluntary conditions, and they are
23	Margaritaville Resort Casino, who
24	achieved 79.6 out of a goal of
25	90 percent, and L'Auberge du Lac, who
	14
1	achieved 72.6 out of a goal of
2	80 percent.
3	Minority procurement, six licensees
4	did not achieve compliance with their
5	voluntary conditions, and they are:
6	DiamondJacks, who achieved 9.7 out of
7	10 percent; Sam's Town achieved 10.1 out
8	of 25 percent; Horseshoe achieved 25.2
9	out of 35 percent; Treasure Chest
10	achieved 13.1 out of 15 percent; Amelia
11	Belle achieved 11.3 out of 30 percent,
12	and Eldorado achieved 19 out of
13	25 percent.
14	Female procurement, two licensees
15	did not meet their voluntary conditions,
16	and they are: Boomtown New Orleans, who
17	achieved 14.3 out of 15 percent, and
18	Hollywood, who achieved 8.1 out of
19	10 percent.
20	Are there any questions regarding
21	the riverboats?
22	CHAIRMAN JONES: It appears we fell
23	off the wagon in the second quarter.

24	The first quarter was superlative, and a
25	particular note, because we brought them
	15
1	before the Board last year, Horseshoe
2	continues to show improvement; and I'm
3	proud of that. Whatever it is they're
4	doing I hope they can share with the
5	other properties, but there was a fall
6	off. And I don't know what that's
7	attributable to. In the fall, we will
8	look at who we need to bring in and talk
9	about those reasons, but I was happier
10	with the first quarter than I was the
11	second quarter.
12	Thank you, Mesa, you can continue.
13	Were there any questions from the Board?
14	[No response.] Please continue.
15	MS. BROWN: Thank you. I'll begin
16	with racetrack. In the second quarter
17	of 2016, approximately 1,648 people were
18	employed by the racetrack casino
19	industry. Of that number, 1,392 were
20	Louisiana residents, 8,071 were
21	minorities and 958 were women.
22	Three racetrack casinos achieved
23	total compliance this quarter, and they
24	are: Louisiana Downs, Evangeline Downs
25	& Fairgrounds Delta Downs did not

- 1 achieve its Louisiana condition. It
- 2 achieved 63.4 out of the 80 percent
- 3 condition.
- 4 Are there any questions regarding
- 5 the racetracks?
- 6 CHAIRMAN JONES: Just for the
- 7 benefit of my fellow board members, I
- 8 recently met with the general manager at
- 9 Delta Downs, and theirs is a peculiar
- situation because they're just about the
- 11 first exit inside Louisiana out of Texas
- and competing with three major
- properties in the Lake Charles area.
- 14 They struggle with employment, but I'm
- satisfied, based on what they've laid
- out to me, that they're vigilant in
- 17 trying to come towards their goal. So I
- 18 just wanted to share that with the
- 19 Board. Thank you.
- 20 MS. BROWN: Thank you.
- 21 CHAIRMAN JONES: No other questions.
- 22 VI. VIDEO GAMING ISSUES
- 23 A. Consideration of the following truckstop
- 24 applications:
- 25 1. Rand Investments, LLC, d/b/a Bayou

- 1 Casino No. 2900517383 (new
- 2 application)
- 3 CHAIRMAN JONES: Okay. Now we'll go

4	to Video Gaming Issues. First up:
5	Consideration of truckstop application
6	of Rand Investments, LLC, doing business
7	as Bayou Casino. That's No. 2900517383.
8	This is a new application.
9	Good morning, gentlemen.
10	MR. PITRE: Morning, Chairman.
11	Chairman Jones, Board Members, I'm
12	Assistant Attorney General Earl Pitre,
13	Jr., appearing before the Board in the
14	matter of the original application of
15	Rand Investments, LLC, doing business as
16	Bayou Casino, applying for approval of a
17	Type 5 video draw poker gaming license.
18	The establishment is located at 4322
19	Highway 90, Suite A, Des Allemands,
20	Louisiana, in Lafourche Parish.
21	On March 31st, 2016, the following
22	transfers occurred: Baron Oil
23	Truckstop, LLC, doing business as Bayou
24	Casino, sold the business and business
25	assets to the applicant, and Baron Oil
	18
1	Truckstop, LLC, sold to the applicant
2	all of their rights, title and interest
3	in their immovable property of the
4	truckstop facility and its interest in
5	the lease of real estate property that

was also part of the truckstop facility.

7	The members of the applicant are:
8	Raymond Garofalo, Jr., with 50 percent
9	and George Caraway with 50 percent.
10	Trooper Vincent Lenguyen conducted
11	the suitability investigation of the
12	relevant persons associated with the
13	application and conducted an on-site
14	inspection of the truckstop facility.
15	He is present before the Board to report
16	his findings.
17	TROOPER LENGUYEN: Good morning,
18	Chairman Jones and Board Members. My
19	name is Trooper Vincent Lenguyen with
20	Louisiana State Police Gaming
21	Enforcement Division. I conducted the
22	suitability investigation on all
23	relevant persons associated with the
24	application.
25	Raymond Garofalo, Jr., Joan
	19
1	Garofalo, George Caraway and Deborah
2	Caraway previously submitted to a
3	suitability investigation in connection
4	with other video poker licenses.
5	An updated courtesy check was
6	performed that revealed no information
7	that would preclude them from
8	participating in the gaming industry.
9	An on-site inspection was conducted,

10	and it was determined that the
11	establishment meet all criteria set
12	forth in the video gaming law as a
13	qualified truckstop facility. All
14	required license and permit were posted
15	and valid at the time of inspection.
16	The establishment consists of
17	5.018 acres.
18	Rand Investments, LLC, submitted a
19	video draw poker license application
20	under a change of ownership; therefore,
21	they are not subject to the rule that
22	they must be one mile from a school,
23	church, playground, synagogue, public
24	library, residence and building on the
25	National Historic Registry.
	20
1	I found no information that would
2	preclude the issuance of the Type 5
3	license to Rand Investments, LLC, doing
4	business as Bayou Casino.
5	MR. PITRE: The Office of the
6	Attorney General has reviewed the file
7	compiled as a result of the
8	investigation conducted by the Office of
9	State Police. Our review indicates that
10	no information has been found that would
11	preclude approval.
12	CHAIRMAN JONES: And just for the

- record, I want to confirm: There are no
- 14 ethical prohibitions to Mr. Garofalo, in
- 15 his total responsibilities as a state
- 16 representative, in this transaction,
- 17 correct?
- 18 MR. PITRE: Correct, sir.
- 19 CHAIRMAN JONES: Okay. Are there
- any questions?
- 21 MR. GASTON: I move, Mr. Chairman.
- 22 CHAIRMAN JONES: We have a motion to
- 23 approve by Dr. Gaston. We have a second
- by Mr. Stipe.
- 25 Any objection? Without objection,

- 1 the application is approved. Thank you.
- 2 2. Chardele Enterprises, Inc., d/b/a Chardele
- 3 Enterprises, Inc. No. 1000503988(transfer of
- 4 interest)
- 5 CHAIRMAN JONES: Next up is Chardele
- 6 Enterprises, Inc., doing business as
- 7 Chardele Enterprises, Inc., No.
- 8 1000503988. This is a transfer of
- 9 interest. Good morning.
- 10 MR. MEEK: Good morning, Chairman
- 11 Jones, Members of the Board. I'm
- 12 Matthew Meek, Assistant Attorney
- 13 General, present before the Board in the
- matter of the transfer of 50 percent
- 15 stock in Chardele Enterprises,

16	Incorporated, which holds a Type 5
17	license.
18	On February 7th, 2016, Adele Harris,
19	who was a 25 percent owner of the
20	licensee and held a usufruct over
21	another 25 percent, passed way. She
22	left her 25 percent ownership interest
23	to her three children and five
24	grandchildren in certain percentages.
25	When Adele passed, her usufruct
	22
1	terminated, and her eight legatees
2	gained full ownership in the other
3	25 percent.
4	Seven of her legatees renounced
5	their rights in the succession and
6	donated their portions of the 25 percent
7	to the eighth legatee, Raymond Harris,
8	Jr. They also donated their percentages
9	in the other 25 percent to Raymond
10	Harris, Jr., causing him to be the
11	50 percent owner of the licensee.
12	Criminal Investigator Glenn Verrett
13	conducted an investigation of the
14	transfers. He is present this morning
15	to report his findings to the Board.
16	TROOPER VERRETT: Good morning,
17	Mr. Chairman, Board Members.
18	I investigated the transfers that

19	occurred in the licensee due to the
20	death of Miss Adele M. Harris and
21	donations thereafter and found no
22	information that would preclude the
23	continuing licensing of Chardele
24	Enterprises, Inc., or that would
25	preclude Raymond D. Harris, Jr., from
	23
1	being found suitable to participate in
2	Louisiana's gaming industry.
3	MR. MEEK: The Office of the
4	Attorney General has reviewed the file
5	prepared by the Office of State Police,
6	and the information contained thereir
7	would not preclude approval.
8	CHAIRMAN JONES: I see that the
9	Board is clear. If there are no
10	questions, do I have a motion to
11	approve? By Mr. Stipe.
12	MS. THERIOT: Second.

24	Casino Gaming Issues. First up's,
25	Consideration for Request for Approval
	24
1	of Compulsive Gaming Employee Training
2	by Hollywood Casino in Baton Rouge, No.
3	RO11700193. Good morning.
4	MS. BROWN: Good morning, Chairman
5	Jones and Members of the Board. I'm
6	Mesa Brown, Assistant Attorney General,
7	and also here is Tony Frabbiele, General
8	Manager of Louisiana Casino Cruises,
9	Inc., d/b/a Hollywood Casino Baton
10	Rouge, appearing before you today on the
11	matter of Hollywood's request for Board
12	approval of an online Compulsive Gaming
13	Training Program.
14	Hollywood currently conducts both
15	its new hire orientation training and
16	its annual training on-site. Hollywood
17	employees conduct the new hire
18	orientation training, and Hollywood
19	contracts with Baton Rouge Community
20	College to conduct the annual training.
21	Hollywood is only seeking to change the
22	annual training. If approved, Hollywood
23	would use the online training program in
24	lieu of the annual responsible gaming

25	training program currently conducted
	25
1	on-site by Baton Rouge Community
2	College.
3	I'll begin with background
4	information. The Louisiana Legislature
5	passed the Uniform Compulsive Gaming Act
6	in 2001. Pursuant to this enactment,
7	the Louisiana Gaming Control Board
8	adopted Rules 301 to 304 to aid in the
9	development of a statewide uniform
10	compulsive and problem gaming program.
11	Gaming law requires each casino to
12	submit its compulsive gaming program
13	outlining its policies and procedures
14	for Board approval.
15	Louisiana Revised Statute 27:27.1(L)
16	specifically provides that riverboat
17	licensees must demonstrate to the Board
18	compliance with the education and
19	training provisions of this section by
20	providing proof of attendance by all
21	employees when they are hired and
22	annually thereafter at one of the
23	following education programs: Training
24	programs conducted by the Louisiana
25	Association on Compulsive Gambling, any
	26

1 other course on problem and compulsive

2	gaming training approved by the Board.
3	Approval of the Hollywood's online
4	training program would allow the entire
5	program to be handled in-house, and
6	Hollywood would no longer contract with
7	BRCC to conduct its annual training.
8	This program has been reviewed and
9	approved by the Louisiana Association on
10	Compulsive Gaming. It has also been
11	reviewed by the Attorney General's
12	Office and meets the legal requirements
13	for a training program.
14	CHAIRMAN JONES: Would you like to
15	add anything?
16	MR. FRABBIELE: Chairman Jones,
17	Members of the Board, good to be here
18	this morning. We are very committed to
19	the responsible gaming in the State of
20	Louisiana, and I want to thank Mesa
21	Brown, as well as Janet Miller from the
22	compulsive gaming office for their
23	assistance through this process. We
24	feel this is the best way for us to
25	administer the program and get the
	27
1	information to our employees in an
2	effective way to ensure that they retain
3	the material and help those that are in
4	need.

5	CHAIRMAN JONES: And thank you and
6	your team for your work on this matter.
7	The legislature in their wisdom, when
8	they approved gaming years ago, saw that
9	this was an important component to make
10	sure that those who were who had
11	exposure and vulnerabilities to
12	compulsive gaming were we had proper
13	training that we could identify those
14	individuals and make sure that there
15	were opportunities for them to get
16	assistance and help, and these are key
17	components of the overall program. And
18	we appreciate the work that you've done
19	in bringing it to us.
20	Were there any questions from the
21	Board? Unless Miss Miller has some
22	comment, I'll accept a motion to approve

1	MR. GASTON: Mr. Chairman, while
2	they're coming up, I'd like to comment:
3	L'Auberge has been so wonderful with the
4	people who have been flooded, taking
5	them in in the middle of the night,
6	doing everything they can, just helping
7	them when they didn't have any
8	necessities. I just wanted to commend
9	them. They wasn't making money off of
10	these people; they weren't gambling in
11	their facility. It was just wonderful.
12	CHAIRMAN JONES: And, actually,
13	we've heard from many of the properties
14	in Louisiana, including Harrah's in New
15	Orleans, who have put together a number
16	of things for those who have been
17	affected by the flooding. Thanks for
18	reminding me. I was amiss in not
19	recognizing what the industry has done
20	to help out the people who have been
21	affected by this flooding in the central
22	Louisiana area, and we thank the
23	industry for that.
24	MR. GASTON: Yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN JONES: Please proceed.

1	Miss Staes or her representative is not
2	here.
3	MR. LEWIS: Assistant Attorney
4	General representing the Office of State
5	Police in this matter. Mr. Chairman,
6	esteemed Board Members, we asked for the
7	rehearing today, and before you first is
8	whether or not we should be allowed to
9	have this matter to be reheard, and
10	second is the rehearing of the matter.
11	We stated three grounds in our
12	motion for as a reason for this
13	matter to be heard. One, is a Board
14	Member should recused himself; two, the
15	decision was contrary to law, and three,
16	new evidence was admitted.
17	The Louisiana law states that a
18	member shall withdraw from any
19	proceeding in which he cannot be fair
20	and impartial. At the previous board
21	meeting, Mr. Singleton indicated that he
22	has known Mrs. Staes' family over the
23	years, and it was hard for him to
24	believe that she had done something like
25	this.
	36
1	Now, I understand this Board's

2 compassion, but the decision must be

3	based on law; and it appears that this
4	decision was not. What I'm asking and
5	what I have seen this Honorable Board do
6	is to make decisions that are consistent
7	with prior Board decisions regarding
8	countless other permittees.
9	Specifically, in the case of Leslie
10	White, the facts and circumstances are
11	very similar to this case. In the White
12	case, the hearing officer and the Board
13	ruled that given the information and the
14	facts and the law, the permittee did not
15	prove that she was suitable to holding a
16	gaming permit. In both cases, the
17	applicants failed to provide information
18	regarding a material fact in determining
19	suitability. Additionally, both
20	applicants provided a sworn affidavit
21	alleging it was someone else, and
22	neither provided a shred of evidence to
23	support this claim.
24	Mrs. Staes' version of these events
25	is constantly changing. Prior to the
	37
1	revocation hearing, she provided a
2	notarized affidavit indicating that it
3	was an unknown relative. Then at the
4	time of the hearing, it was represented
5	that Mrs. Staes did. in fact, write the

6	checks. At the appeal, which was not
7	the proper forum to give new
8	information, she claimed it was her
9	sister. At no time during the
10	adjudication did she provide any
11	information to support this allegation.
12	This information was not presented at
13	that revocation hearing; it was not
14	presented as evidence, and it was not
15	part of the record. Therefore, it
16	should not have been allowed or
17	considered at the appeal.
18	Further, we have evidence to show
19	that Mrs. Staes made appearances on two
20	separate matters for issuing worthless
21	checks. She paid the fines and the fees
22	associated with them.
23	As a Gaming Control Board, you are
24	bound by the law when making decisions.
25	You made decisions on countless other
	38
1	cases based on law, and here you must do
2	the exact same thing and base your
3	decision on law, not on emotions,
4	personal feelings or empathy for the
5	permittee. And for these reasons, the
6	Division respectfully requests that you
7	grant the motion for the rehearing of
8	the appeal of the matter of Johnette

- 9 Staes.
- 10 CHAIRMAN JONES: Thank you. I'm
- going to move that we grant the motion
- for reconsideration, and out of an
- abundance of caution, since information
- 14 was introduced in the last meeting which
- 15 was not under oath, not subject to
- 16 cross-examination, I'm going to further

1	sentenced to probation. She pled guilty
2	to and was sentenced to probation.
3	Now, aggravated pleading guilty
4	to aggravated assault is a statutory
5	disqualifier. There's no cleansing
6	period. She plead guilty to this. We
7	have the documentation to show that.
8	Because of that, the hearing officer
9	based the decision that she should be
10	revoked, and we are here today saying
11	that decision should be affirmed.
12	CHAIRMAN JONES: Board Members, any
13	questions?
14	Do I have a motion? [No response.]
15	Move to affirm?
16	MR. STIPE: Yes.
17	CHAIRMAN JONES: By Mr. Stipe to

- affirm.
- 19 Do I have a second?
- 20 MR. GASTON: Second.
- 21 CHAIRMAN JONES: Dr. Gaston.
- 22 Any objection? Without objection,
- the hearing officer's decision is
- affirmed. Thank you so much for coming.

- 3 CHAIRMAN JONES: Next up is in

7	information which you're not permitted
8	to do.
9	MS. PAESTE: That's correct.
10	CHAIRMAN JONES: All right. So you
11	can't talk about any of that this
12	morning.
13	MS. PAESTE: Okay.
14	CHAIRMAN JONES: You can't talk
15	about anything that hasn't already been
16	introduced, okay?
17	MS. PAESTE: Okay.
18	CHAIRMAN JONES: You may explain to
19	the Board now why you think the facts
20	were either incorrect or the law was
21	incorrect as applied to your case.
22	MS. PAESTE: The law was not
23	incorrect. I marked the wrong box. I

24	absolutely did. I made a mistake. I've
25	been in this business 17 years. The
	44
1	last thing I wanted to do was lie. I
2	have a great work ethic, and I've been
3	with this company a long time. It was a
4	"no bill." It was one ticket. That's
5	what I'm here for.
6	You know, my history my personal
7	life is not my professional life. I've
8	never brought my problems to work.
9	That's what I was taught. That's what I
10	stuck with all these years. I'm sorry
11	that my personal life doesn't coincide
12	with the law. You know, it has its
13	issues, and I'm still in that process.
14	I'm working on it. We're still in the
15	last findings of this last situation
16	that I'm in, and it hasn't been proven
17	one way or another.
18	So what I'm here for is that ticket
19	that I failed to comply with and turn
20	in, and that's cost me my 17 years.
21	That's all.
22	CHAIRMAN JONES: Okay.
23	MS. BOGRAN: Okay. Good morning,
24	Chairman Jones, Board Members.
25	CHAIRMAN JONES: Morning.

1	MS. BOGRAN: I'm Olga Bogran
2	Assistant Attorney General in the Gaming
3	Division.
4	We are here at Miss Paeste's request
5	because she's appealing the hearing
6	officer's decision regarding her
7	suitability to maintain her gaming
8	permit. Her ability to be your friend,
9	her work ethic is not the issue here,
LO	but the issue is whether she maintained
l1	her suitability.
12	Gaming, as we know, by statute is a
13	highly regulated environment. The
L4	holding of a gaming permit is a
15	privilege, not a right, and any person
16	seeking to have a gaming permit must be
L7	suitable and then must remain so.
18	Having said that, it would be impossible
19	to keep eyes on every gaming permittee
20	24/7, 365 days a year, but there are
21	checkpoints that allow for oversight.
22	And one of the most important
23	checkpoints is the gaming application.
24	Questions on the gaming application
25	are tailored to be clear on what they're
	46
1	asking for. For example, the arrest
2	questions don't just ask general arrest
3	information. They specify things, like:

4	Were you detained; were you issued a
5	summons; were you issued a citation?
6	And because the answers to these
7	applications play a pivotal role in the
8	regulatory oversight of gaming
9	permittees, misrepresentations,
10	omissions or lies are not acceptable on
11	the gaming applications.
12	Over the years, Miss Paeste, as she
13	said, she's had a long career. She
14	submitted several applications, and
15	she's familiar with these forms. She's
16	used these forms to show that in 1996,
17	she pled guilty to battery charges and
18	then again in 2001. She disclosed that
19	she was arrested for charges of
20	aggravated assault, which were reduced
21	to simple assault by the time of the
22	conviction in 2012. But after that
23	arrest, all those disclosures became an
24	issue.
25	On September 3rd, 2015, Miss Paeste
	47
1	was charged with simple battery. She
2	submitted her renewal application, at
3	the end of that month, September 30th,
4	four weeks later, and she did not
5	disclose the September 3rd charges. One

month later, on November 18th, she was,

6

7	again, charged with simple battery.
8	That charge was not disclosed to the
9	Division, keeping in mind that gaming
10	law requires that such things are
11	disclosed to the Division within 15
12	days.
13	On January January 4, which was a
14	point in time which Miss Paeste had not
15	received her renewal confirmation at
16	that point and it was the day of the
17	expiration of her gaming permit, she
18	disclosed the September 3rd charges, but
19	not the November 18th charges, to the
20	Division. Because of her increasing
21	number of battery charges and because of
22	the failure to fully disclose, the
23	Division issued a denial of renewal, and
24	Miss Paeste requested a hearing; but
25	just three weeks before her hearing,
	48
1	Miss Paeste was, again, arrested for
2	simple battery charges. The charges
3	were not disclosed to the Division, but
4	they, of course, validated the
5	Division's denial on the basis of the

increased activity that was violent in

In fact, the arresting officers

testified at the hearing that in their

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nature.

10	encounters with Miss Paeste, she had
11	been violent, aggressive and volatile.
12	Miss Paeste has been in the Gaming
13	Division for a long time in gaming
14	for a long time, but the statutory duty
15	to remain suitable is not waived because
16	of seniority of employment.
17	At the hearing, Miss Paeste
18	indicated that a third party was the
19	root and cause of most of the problems,
20	but that person is not a gaming
21	permittee; and that person is does
22	not have the duty to remain suitable,
23	but what has been consistent throughout
24	the six battery charges that were
25	addressed at the hearing was that Miss
	49
1	Paeste was the common denominator.
2	The Division carefully reviewed the
3	facts before they issued their
4	recommendation of denial, and the
5	hearing officer thoughtfully considered
6	all of the evidence that was presented,
7	including the arguments put forth by
8	Miss Paeste's attorney, the witness's
9	testimony Miss Paeste's witness
10	testimony and Miss Paeste's testimony.
11	The hearing officer found that she
12	failed to carry the burden of proving by

13	clear and convincing, a burden of proof
14	which is imposed by gaming law, to prove
15	that she was still suitable to maintain
16	her gaming permit.
17	In consideration of these facts, but
18	especially in light of the fact that
19	this board has consistently demanded
20	that there be truth and candor in gaming
21	applications, we ask you to affirm the
22	hearing officer's decision in finding
23	that she is unsuitable to maintain a
24	gaming permit.
25	CHAIRMAN JONES: Are there any
	50
1	questions from the Board?
2	Miss Paeste, you mentioned something
3	in your statement that you have your
4	professional life, and you have your
5	personal life.
6	MS. PAESTE: That's correct.
7	CHAIRMAN JONES: And in most
8	occupations, those two things seldom
9	overlap, one has nothing to do with the
10	other; and the Board isn't here to judge
11	who you are, but we do judge conduct and
12	we do judge behavior.
13	MS. PAESTE: You know
14	CHAIRMAN JONES: Excuse me. Okay?
15	MS. PAESTE: Okay.

- 16 CHAIRMAN JONES: The legislature has
- set a standard for conduct in this
- industry. Our job is simply to uphold
- 19 that standard of conduct --
- 20 MS. PAESTE: I gotcha.
- 21 CHAIRMAN JONES: -- okay?
- You were permitted to work in this
- 23 industry with previous violations.
- MS. PAESTE: That's correct.
- 25 CHAIRMAN JONES: You knew that,

- 1 okay? And then you had additional
- 2 violations. Based on that, I'm going to
- 3 move that we affirm the hearing
- 4 officer's decision.
