Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, and  
Members of the Louisiana Legislature

As mandated by law, La. R.S. 27:15(b), the Louisiana Gaming Control Board submits its annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1997. The revenues reported are cumulative since inception of gaming and data for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1997 is highlighted separately.

Since this is a fiscal year session, we will propose no legislation. However, the Board is actively studying reports relating to underage presence on the riverboats, as well as compulsive gambling, contacts with local schools and sailing patterns of the riverboats. The Board is concerned about the lack of a fine schedule strong enough to be a deterrent for potential infractions by boat operators relating to underage admissions.

As regarding budgeting matters, the appropriations bill before you reflects a standstill situation with the bottom line approximately \$200,000 smaller than the current year. For fiscal year 1997-1998, the operating budget is \$4,229,700 and the appropriation for next year is \$4,025,625. In the current year almost 75% (\$3,177,000) of our budget is transferred to the Department of Justice for legal, clerical, research and investigative assistance. The remaining funds, slightly more than \$1,000,000 were used for Board operations and include \$240,000 reimbursements to riverboats for prior assessments not authorized by statute. The balance (\$760,000) was expended for Board salaries, travel, office rent, communications, supplies and for professional services relating to hearings. This last item may prove to be a budgetary problem because of the increase in hearings and appeals. The Board and the Department of Public Safety (State Police) have taken a more stringent approach to suitability than in former years that has increased the workload of Hearing Officers and Court Reporters.

In addition to revenue reports, the document attempts to highlight expenditures that create economic benefits to the state and local government over and above the excise tax receipts. A section of the report is devoted to the secondary impact of "industry" spending from which you can draw your own conclusions.

## **ECONOMIC IMPACT**

## ECONOMIC IMPACT

Because of its nation-wide growth, resulting in the creation of almost a half million jobs and billions of dollars in revenue to state and local governments, economists have classified gaming as an industry. As such it produces (wherever it operates) both direct and indirect economic benefits.

The former (direct) generally includes such items such as taxes, dollar value of purchases and employment data in numbers and wages paid. This information as it relates to riverboat gaming is presented in graphic form at the head of this section. The reader will observe that the money placed in circulation by procurement and payroll (including benefits) more than doubles the tax incomes to state and local government.

The indirect economic impact comes into play as one follows the trail of wage and procurement dollars. When people are employed they generally spend their money for goods and services. These dollars translate into additional jobs and create another money trail which economists label as secondary and tertiary impact. In the jargon of practicing economists this is generally referred to as the multiplier factor. Many theorists maintain that the money turns over (multiplier) from three to seven times, depending on the nature of the benefits. Using a multiplier as low as three, the impact stated in terms of dollars is significant.

There are those who espouse the negative effect by claiming that the loss of disposable income, as a result of gaming activities, reduces consumer spending; and in effect creates a negative money trail. In addition, the occurrence of disrupted households and the accompanying trauma point to a socio-economic problem. Finally, it is imputed that criminal activities generates an additional cost for judicial and law enforcement entities on the state and local levels.

Their debate will continue until exhaustive research and the creation of the econometric model comes into being. Until then we can only assume that the positive occurs in areas like Lake Charles and Shreveport/Bossier since the bulk of the participants (60-80 percent) are out of state residents.

It is the intention of the Board to consider the possibility of engaging the services of a qualified economist(s) to undertake the tasks of research and model development. Current research has been done on the behalf of the American Gaming Association and the Casino Association of America. We would prefer that our designee be free from any such ties.

In the months of May and October (1997), two of the country's largest consulting firms, Arthur Anderson and Coopers and Lybrand rendered their reports on the economic impact of gaming in the United States. In each, a segment was directed to the State of Louisiana. Both research efforts have been done at the request of gaming interests.

The Coopers and Lybrand document , the result of a survey of seventy percent (9816) of Louisiana gaming industry employees reported the following findings:

● Employees removed from welfare status	11.2%
● Employees no longer receiving food stamps	13.2%
● Employees no longer receiving unemployment benefits	20.2%
● Employees receiving better health care	63.7%
● Purchasing of housing	3,240
● Purchasing of care	8,707
● Purchasing of major appliances	9,184
● Restaurant meals purchased (monthly)	11,037
● Money donated to charity	\$1,924,000

While the above detail may contain some exaggeration they do indicate significant socio-economic trends and in what areas payroll dollars are being spent.

The Arthur Anderson survey selected the Shreveport/Bossier's case as one of three jurisdictions that were relatively new and had an adequate gaming history.

The findings generally mirrored those of the other study. One interesting observation is the fact that it is stated that gaming receipts collected by Bossier Parish Government obviated the need for property taxes.

As the gaming industry stabilizes and matures, the Board in keeping with its legislative mandate, will provide the most correct, most accurate and most unbiased economic impact data available.

Mississippi Gaming Operations are self-supported by specially dedicated funds generated through enforcement, investigations and other collected regulatory fees. In the event that there is a deficit in the special funds, the legislature may authorize expenditures from the General Fund. Amounts contributed to the budget from the special funds are shown below.
