Mr. President, Mr. Speaker and Members of the Louisiana Legislature

Current Law (La. R.S. 27:15(b)) requires submission of an annual report by the Louisiana Gaming Control Board. This document, our third, addresses those elements that are mandated to be contained in the document.

This has been an extremely active year for the Board. Its agenda included a variety of items that required long deliberate study and difficult decision making. It owes a deep, sense of obligation to the offices of the Attorney General and the State Police for their thorough research and analysis of the legal, financial and technical matters, extremely valuable in the decision making process by the Board.

Briefly, let us highlight some of the major actions taken during the past fiscal year. Hilton and its associate requested a move of their riverboat from New Orleans to Shreveport. The Board concurred, but stipulated that if the move was not completed and operational by October 1997, gaming activities would cease at the New Orleans site. Lack of action by the Hilton group resulted in the loss of the berth. In subsequent action Hilton withdrew from the project and its partner, New Orleans Paddlewheels, assumed control of the license. The latter was successful in securing two partners with extensive gaming experience and sufficient capital to expedite the move to Shreveport. The financial credibility and background suitability were researched by State Police and found to be acceptable. The Board subsequently approved the project which was endorsed by civic and financial leaders of Caddo Parish.

Of major interest is the land-based casino in New Orleans. The operating contract was amended as a result of considerable man hours of research and negotiations. As a result of a Supreme Court decision affirming the authority of the Board to approve the operating contract, the Board empowered the Chairman to sign it and it became effective on October 27, 1998. Its terms require that operations must start within one year of that date, unless construction is delayed by conditions spelled out in the contract.

Still pending is the matter of the fifteenth license. During the last fiscal session, the legislature responded to a suggestion by the Board (see last annual reports) and appropriated the sum of \$600,000 for a study to examine the socioeconomic impact of gaming in Louisiana. The project is headed by the University of New Orleans with support from six other university entities and two specialized research groups. The Board voted to suspend consideration of license applications until the study is presented to the Legislature in the 1999-2000 session.

Concurrent with these matters, the Board continued its investigation into the cruising records of the riverboats. It became apparent that the relatively low incidence of sailing (64 percent cancellation statewide average) was due to decisions by the boat captains attributed to high water, winds, currents, poor visibility and excessive river traffic. It was a universal complaint that the mandated design of the boats (an extremely high silhouette) made steering difficult in windy conditions. In addition, it became apparent that in some instances the location of the berth made the departure and docking process difficult to accomplish. The Board is currently taking the matter under advisement and seems inclined to propose certain changes after conducting public hearings on the matter.

During the past year, the Board continued to address the subject of compulsive gambling. It held several public meetings and conducted forums where prominent researchers related their experience in other states and stated that Louisiana was in the forefront in state support for treatment programs. One of the research entities also serves on the University of New Orleans Economic Impact Study Team. As of this writing, the Board is awaiting input from the Louisiana Riverboat Association on corrective and preventive measures aimed at lessening the problem. As a result of legislative action relative to underage gaming on riverboats (raising the age limitations and permitting a higher fine schedule) and restrictive measures initiated by the industry, the Board temporarily shifted its attention to other matters. A major portion of the report is devoted to displays of fiscal information on video poker, Indian casino and riverboat gaming. As an added feature demographic data on purchasing and employment statistics lend a socioeconomic flavor. As required by statute, the report includes comparison with other states conducting like forms of gaming. For the first time, the State of South Carolina makes an appearance since it has legalized the conduct of video poker.

In the current fiscal year, the Board was appropriated the sum of \$8,125,205. Approximately 12% of this amount was directly applicable to Board activities and the balance was made available to State Police and the Attorney General. Their Board related functions included legal representation, research, administrative assistance, investigations, and regulatory supervision of all gaming under Board control. For the first time, activities related to the land-based casino made their appearance in the budget. As per the contract, the casino operators reimbursed the state for all expenses relating to the development and execution of the operating contract as well as the cost to State Police and the Attorney General for suitability investigations of the principals and key employees of the casino. The largest single expenditure (\$600,000) in the budget of the Board itself is for a legislatively authorized study of the socioeconomic effects of gaming in Louisiana. All other expenditures were at a lower level than the prior year including the expenditure (\$213,000) for hearing officers and court reporters. The balance of the appropriation (less than \$400,000) was for rent, travel, supplies and compensation of Board members. As has been the custom for the past two years, careful budget execution will result in a fund surplus. The budget before you now will propose an escalation of supervision of the land-based casino by assignment of additional state

troopers to the facility, as well as an allocation of \$500,000 to the Problem and Compulsive Gaming fund. In all other aspects, the budget will be approximately the same as in the current year. The Board itself has requested an additional hearing officer to assist in the workload associated with the land-based casino.

The Louisiana Gaming Control Board will continue its policy of expecting exemplary performance by the gaming industry and its employees. It will continue to require that strict adherence to statutes and regulations be maintained and that the public is protected from elements and conditions adverse to sound public policy.
