5	IV. REVENUE REPORTS
6	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Revenue reports.
7	MS. JACKSON: Good morning, Mr.
8	Chairman, Board Members. My name is
9	Donna Jackson with the Louisiana State
10	Police Gaming Audit Section.
11	The riverboat revenue report for
12	February 2011 is shown on page one of
13	your handout. During February, the 13
14	operating riverboats generated Adjusted
15	Gross Receipts of \$138,399,920, up \$5.5
16	million or four percent from last month,
17	but down \$6.6 million or 4.6 percent
18	from last February.
19	Adjusted Gross Receipts for fiscal
20	year 2010-2011 to date are

21	\$1,086,000,000, a slight decrease of
22	\$1.6 million from fiscal year 2009-2010.
23	During February, the State collected
24	fees totaling \$29,755,983. As of
25	February 28th, 2011, the State has
	9
1	collected approximately \$234 million in
2	fees for fiscal year 2010-2011.
3	Next is a summary of the
4	February 2011 gaming activity for
5	Harrah's New Orleans found on page
6	three. During February, Harrah's
7	generated \$28,048,215 in gross gaming
8	revenue, up \$1.7 million or 6 percent
9	from last month, but down \$1 million or
10	four percent from last February. Fiscal
11	year-to-date gaming revenues for
12	2010-2011 are \$230 million, up
13	\$1.2 million or 1 percent from fiscal
14	year 2009-2010.
15	During February, the State received
16	\$4.6 million in minimum daily payments.
17	As of February 28th, 2011, the State has
18	collected almost \$40 million in fees for
19	fiscal year 2010-2011.
20	Slots at the Racetracks revenues are
21	shown on page four. During February,
22	the four racetrack facilities combined
23	generated Adjusted Gross Receipts of

24	\$33,013,352, an increase of \$1 million
25	or three percent from last month, but a
	10
1	decrease of \$1.5 million or four percent
2	from last February.
3	Adjusted Gross Receipts for fiscal
4	year 2010-2011 to date are \$254 million,
5	a minimal decrease from fiscal year
6	2009-2010.
7	During February, the State collected
8	fees totaling \$5 million. As of
9	February 28th, 2011, the State has
10	collected over \$38 million in fees for
11	fiscal year 2010-2011.
12	Overall, riverboats, landbased and
13	Slots at the Racetracks generated
14	\$199 million, which is \$9 million or
15	4 percent less than last February.
16	Are there any questions before I
17	present the Harrah's employees
18	information?
19	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Any questions?
20	MS. JACKSON: Once again, I've
21	included a spreadsheet for the employee
22	numbers in the chart folders. Harrah's
23	New Orleans is required to maintain at
24	least 2,400 employees in a bi-weekly
25	payroll of \$1,750,835. This report

1	covers the two pay periods in
2	February 2011.
3	For the first pay period, the audit
4	section verified 2,427 employees with a
5	payroll of \$2,069,000. For the second
6	pay period, the audit section verified
7	2,437 employees with a payroll of
8	\$2,051,000. Therefore, Harrah's met the
9	employee criteria during February.
10	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Can you elaborate
11	on the on-call status?
12	MS. JACKSON: Jeff Traylor would be
13	a better person to address that.
14	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: I had a question
15	about are they counted or not?
16	MR. TRAYLOR: Jeff Traylor, Audit
17	Director for State Police.
18	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: On the numbers,
19	are the on-call personnel counted?
20	MR. TRAYLOR: Yes. The ones who are
21	working during the pay period or that
22	have worked recently, not anybody who
23	hasn't shown up for work or been at work
24	for months at a time.
25	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: So they actually
	12
1	have to
2	MR. TRAYLOR: They have to be at
3	work, yeah.

4	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Any questions?
5	Okay, thank you. Video gaming.
6	MR. BOSSIER: Good morning, Chairman
7	Morgan and Board Members. My name is
8	Jim Bossier with the Louisiana State
9	Police Gaming Audit Section. I'm
10	reporting video gaming information for
11	February 2011 as shown page one of your
12	handout.
13	During February 2011, 26 new
14	licenses were issued: 14 bars, 11
15	restaurants and 1 device owner.
16	Twenty-four new applications were
17	received during February and are
18	currently pending in the field: 14
19	bars, 9 restaurants and 1 truckstop.
20	During February 2011, the Gaming
21	Enforcement Division assessed \$25,012
22	and collected \$20,712 in penalties.
23	There are currently \$9,000 in
24	outstanding fines. Please refer to page
25	two of your handout.
	13
1	There are presently 14,871 video
2	gaming devices activated at 2,193
3	locations. Net device revenue for
4	February 2011 was \$55,994,723, a
5	\$5.9 million increase, or 11.8 percent
6	when compared to net device revenue for

-	lanuary 2011 and a \$102,000 increase or
7	January 2011, and a \$102,000 increase or
8	two-tenths of one percent when compared
9	to February 2010.
10	Net device revenue for fiscal year
11	2010-2011 to date is \$405,698,841, a
12	\$5.7 million increase, or 1.4 percent
13	when compared to net device revenue for
14	fiscal year 2009-2010. Please refer to
15	page three of your hand excuse me,
16	page three of your handout shows a
17	comparison of net device revenue.
18	Total franchise fees collected for
19	February 2011 were \$16,725,954, a \$1.8
20	million increase when compared to
21	January 2011, and a \$6,000 increase when
22	compared to February 2010.
23	Total franchise fees collected for
24	fiscal year 2010-2011 to date are
25	\$120,772,793, a 1.6 million, or
	14
1	1.3 percent increase when compared to
2	last year's franchise fees. Page four
3	of your handout shows a comparison of
4	franchise fees. Does anybody have any
5	questions?
6	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Any questions?
7	V. CONSIDERATION OF CONTRACTS WITH HEARING
8	OFFICERS AND COURT REPORTER
9	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: We're at Item V,

10	Consideration of Contract for Hearing
11	Officers and Court Reporter. Members,
12	annually we're required to the Board
13	to approve the contracts for both of our
14	hearing officers. The only notable
15	difference is there's been a decrease in
16	the total amount per contract, \$5,000.
17	This was instituted mainly for the
18	reason they didn't expend all the money
19	in the previous years for the contracts,
20	but also it allowed more flexibility
21	with the budget for me to make with
22	other shortfalls in other categories.
23	We also added a standards of
24	conduct. It kind of mirrors what's
25	required of our employees and also of
	15
1	the board members. That was not covered
2	in the previous contract. We have two
3	of those, and then also we have a
4	contract for court reporting services.
5	The aggregate amount stays remained
6	the same; however, the individual cost
7	per page went up slightly and for the
8	appearance mainly because we are
9	under significantly under what other
10	state agencies were paying, and we were
11	just trying to come into conformance
12	with what the contracts were for other

	-
14	Are there any questions on the
15	contracts? We would need a motion to
16	authorize the Chairman to execute the
17	contracts for the hearing officer and
18	the court reporter.
19	COURT REPORTER: You're going to

7	VI. COMPLIANCE REPORTS
8	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Item VI,
9	Compliance Reports.
10	MS. BROWN: Good morning.
11	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: I'd ask anyone to
12	step out and ask them not to vacuum.
13	Can somebody from State Police step out
14	and convince then not to vacuum.
15	MS. BROWN: Chairman Morgan, Board

16	Members, I'm Assistant Attorney General
17	Mesa Brown. I'll be presenting the
18	staff report on riverboat casino and
19	racetrack licensees' compliance with
20	employment and procurement conditions
21	for the fourth quarter of 2010. The
22	fourth quarter reports are taken from
23	figures reported by 13 of the 15
24	operating riverboats to the Louisiana
25	Gaming Control Board.

1	In the fourth quarter of 2010,
2	approximately 11,547 people were
3	employed by the riverboat industry. Of
4	that number, 11,352 were Louisiana

23	In the subcategories under the main
24	category of employment, all licensees
25	either met or exceeded their goal with
	18
1	the exception of one casino. Hollywood
2	Casino fell short of its female goal by
3	achieving 48.6 percent out of a goal of
4	51.86 percent.
5	Next I'll address procurement. The
6	licensees are grouped according to three
7	subcategories which appear in your
8	report: They are Louisiana procurement,
9	minority and female procurement.
10	Louisiana procurement, ten licensees did
11	not achieve compliance with their
12	voluntary conditions. They are Diamond
13	Jacks Casino & Resort who achieved 48.6
14	out of 75; Horseshoe Casino and Hotel
15	achieved 38.6 out of 75; Boomtown Casino
16	West Bank achieved 77.5 out of 80; Belle
17	of Baton Rouge achieved 73.5 out of 75;
18	Treasure Chest, 74 out of 75; Hollywood
19	Casino, 62.3 out of 80; Grand Palais
20	Isle of Capri, 76.1 out of 90; Boomtown
21	Bossier City, 63.9 out of 80; Eldorado

Resort, 53.3 out of 60; and L'Auberge du
-
lac Hotel & Casino, 71.1 out of 80.
In regards to minority procurement,
four licensees did not achieve
19
compliance with their voluntary
conditions, and they are Horseshoe
Casino and Hotel, who achieved 10.9 out
of 35; Hollywood Casino, 9.6 out of 10;
Amelia Belle, 3.8 out of 30; Isle of
Capri Casino St. Charles, 3.6 out of 10
percent.
With regards to female procurement,
one licensee did not reach the goals.
This licensee is Isle of Capri Casino
Grand Palais, who achieved 2.2 out of
8 percent.
Are there any questions?
CHAIRMAN MORGAN: I'll entertain
questions, but I'd like to brief the
board on what we have done the board
staff and also the Attorney General's
Office, with regard to, first,
employment. We have met with Mr. Duty
and with several of the licensees. They
are preparing some of the licensees,
I know two in particular, have prepared
data for us that would illustrate the
downturn in their income and in their

volume of their business, and I asked

20

1	them to put that in a form of a petition
2	that the board will entertain in the
3	future. I anticipate at least two of
4	them to be before the board two
5	licensees before the board next board
6	meeting, and it would be up to the board
7	then to modify the conditions of the
8	license. But what I've seen thus far,
9	it makes sense to do that because of the
10	current economic situation. So with
11	regard to employment, that's been
12	addressed.
13	With regard to procurement, we have
14	an item on the agenda today for
15	rulemaking with regard to Louisiana
16	procurement. That will, I think, assist
17	both the State of Louisiana and the
18	licensees in meeting their goal. But
19	there are some areas that we are going
20	to look at and have before the board. I
21	had mentioned earlier it would be this
22	meeting, but we ran out of time. And we
23	have some more research to do, but it
24	will be mainly driven by geographical
25	area as to stating these goals, because
	21

1 if you notice that, in particular, in

2	Shreveport and some of the other areas
3	there, they're varied by licensee as to
4	what their stated goal is.
5	And they're running into difficulty,
6	in particular with the minority
7	procurement and women procurement
8	well, women procurement actually did
9	very well, minority procurement and
10	Louisiana procurement in certain
11	geographic areas the State. So we'll
12	try to get those more on line, and then
13	the licensees will be able to petition
14	the board to modify those voluntary
15	conditions and goals.
16	Are there any questions with regard
17	to what's been reported on riverboat?
18	Okay.
19	MS. BROWN: I'll now present the
20	staff report on racetrack casino
21	licensees' compliance with statutory
22	employment and procurement conditions
23	for the fourth quarter of 2010. The
24	fourth quarter reports are taken from
25	figures reported by the four racetracks
	22
1	to the Louisiana State Police.
2	In the fourth quarter of 2010,
3	approximately 1,855 people were employed
4	by the industry. Of that number, 1,631

5	were Louisiana residents, 948 were
6	minorities and 1,074 were women. All
7	licensees achieved total compliance with
8	the exception of Delta Downs, and Delta
9	Downs fell short of achieving its
10	Louisiana employment goal of 80 percent
11	by achieving 71.6. Are there any
12	questions?
13	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Any questions?
14	[No response.] Okay, thank you.
15	VII. CASINO GAMING ISSUES
16	A. Consideration of request by L'Auberge du
17	Lac, No. R011001707, for approval of
18	gaming space reconfiguration
19	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Item VII,
20	Consideration of request by L'Auberge du
21	Lac for approval of the gaming space
22	reconfiguration. Sergeant.
23	SERGEANT WATTS: Morning, Mr.
24	Chairman, Members of the Board. I'm
25	Sergeant Jeff Watts with the Louisiana
	23
1	State Police Gaming Enforcement
2	Division.
3	L'Auberge du Lac Casino is
4	requesting a change to their designated
5	gaming area. This was one mentioned
6	earlier, that this was going to be a
7	pretty large reconfiguration which they

8	did. They've basically reconfigured the
9	main deck.
10	With those changes in mind, it was
11	only a net increase of 39 slot machines
12	from 1,577 to 1,616. There were no
13	changes to the number of table games.
14	They currently had 72 games table
15	games.
16	With the overall changes of
17	designated gaming area, it will increase
18	from 24,782 square feet to 27,027 square
19	feet, resulting in an increase of 2,245
20	square feet. Mr. Weisblog of Lay,
21	Pitman, Incorporated, prepared the floor
22	plans. Mr. John Fransic of ABS
23	Consulting approved the changes, and the
24	Division reviewed the proposed floor
25	changes and agrees and concurs with
	24
1	Mr. Weisblog and ABS. I'll answer any
2	questions.
3	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Are there any
4	questions? Anyone like to comment?
5	Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion to
6	approve the gaming space
7	reconfiguration.
8	MS. ROGERS: I'll move.
9	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Motion to approve
10	by Miss Rogers

11	MR. BRADFORD: Second.
12	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: seconded by
13	Mr. Bradford. Any objection? Hearing
14	none, that's approved.
15	SERGEANT WATTS: Thank you, sir.
16	B. Consideration of request by Isle of Capri
17	Casinos, Inc., for approval of \$825
18	Million Senior Secured Credit Facility
19	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Item B,
20	consideration of the request by Isle of
21	Capri Casinos, Incorporated, for
22	approval of \$825 Million Senior Secured
23	Credit Facility. Morning.
24	MS. FICKLIN: Good Morning, Mr.
25	Chairman, Board Members. I'm Evie
	25
1	Ficklin, an auditor in State Police
2	Gaming.
3	Isle of Capri is requesting the
4	Board's approval of its \$825 million
5	amended and restated credit agreement.
6	Isle's existing credit agreement is
7	\$1.25 billion; although, Isle's
8	negotiation with certain of its lenders
9	is still ongoing, Isle's statement is
10	that the proposed revolver will be
11	between 300 and \$325 million and its
12	term loan between 500 and \$525 million,
13	with a total amount of facilities not to

14	exceed \$825 million.
----	-----------------------

15	The revolver will have a five-year
16	maturity and the term loan six years.
17	Isle's existing revolver and term loan
18	under its current credit agreement
19	expiring in 2011 and 2013 respectively.
20	Isle's proposed amended and restated
21	credit agreement is one of three
22	transactions that the company is using
23	to enhance its capital structure and to
24	create a balanced maturity schedule.
25	On January 25th, 2011, Isle issued
	26
1	5.3 million common shares and received
2	approximately \$51.7 million in net
3	proceeds from the issuance. The company
4	used the proceeds from the offering to
5	pay down its revolver. This transaction
6	didn't require Board's approval.
7	On March 7th, 2011, Isle issued
8	300 million and 7.75 percent senior
9	unsecured notes in private placement,
10	using the net proceeds from this
11	issuance to pay down its existing term
12	loan. The company's new 7.75 percent
13	notes mature in 2019. Isle will use the
14	borrowings under its amended and
15	restated credit agreement to pay off the
16	amounts remaining under its existing

17	revolver and existing term loan.
18	The company has received a
19	commitment letter for a portion of the
20	revolver from Wells Fargo Bank, Credit
21	Suisse Kingdom and Deutsche Bank. The
22	commitment letter expires April 30th,
23	2011.
24	Wells Fargo's affiliate, Wells
25	Fargo's Securities, LLC, services the
	27
1	primary bookrunner and primary joint
2	lead arranger. Wells Fargo bank serves
3	as self-administrative agent, and Credit
4	Suisse and Deutsche Bank affiliates
5	serve as joint lead arrangers and joint
6	bookrunners.
7	If Isle receives the Board's
8	approval, it tentatively plans to close
9	on its amended and restated credit
10	agreement March 23rd, 2011. As shown on
11	the projected free cash flow schedule on
12	page 19, Isle projects sufficient cash
13	flows to service its debt. Isle's
14	projected long-term debt is shown on
15	page 20.
16	No financial issues came to our
17	attention to preclude the Board's
18	approval of Isle's amended and restated
19	credit agreement; however, the financial

20	position of any company is always	
21	subject to adverse changes and	
22	conditions which can't be predicted.	
23	Does the Board have any questions?	
24	MR. JONES: Yeah, I'm just curious:	
25	We don't have to approve the stock or	
	28	
1	unsecured bond, but the secured bond we	
2	do have to approve, I presume, because	
3	they're secured with Louisiana property?	
4	MS. FICKLIN: The secured bonds in	
5	this instance don't have to be approved	
6	either. They're issued in a private	
7	placement, which is regulated by the	
8	SEC, so they're exempt from board	
9	approval. They do notify us, though,	
10	that they're going to be doing it. We	
11	reviewed the documentation, and then in	
12	a short order, they're going to issue a	
13	registration statement at which point	
14	the funds become public.	
15	MR. JONES: So we don't have to

6	Jonathan Wagner who handles all of our
7	rulemaking. I just wanted to give you a
8	brief explanation of what this rule is.
9	Currently, there is a definition in
10	the riverboat rules for Louisiana
11	businesses, Louisiana companies,

12	Louisiana corporations. What this does
13	is amend that current definition and add
14	some additional factors.
15	As the Chairman explained earlier,
16	this is in part of our ultimate goal and
17	another step into genializing the
18	definitions of Louisiana procurement and
19	also the reporting requirements that all
20	the licenses have to comply with. One
21	of the amendments to the definition of

25	with the Secretary of State, have a

3	the business; meaning, the employees
4	have to have some sort of management and
5	some sort of operating function in that

4	the licensees in determining what is the
5	definition of Louisiana businesses or
6	Louisiana firm for the purposes of
7	calculating. And just to point out,
8	that this stage of the process, this
9	would just be an initiation of the
10	rulemaking process. As Johnathan can
11	probably explain to you in more detail,
12	there is a comment period, and it's
13	MR. WAGNER: Six months.
14	MR. GAUTREAUX: a six-month total
15	process. So there would be an
16	opportunity for the public to comment on
17	the rule and present comments to the

18	Board at some point.
19	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: And, again, I'd
20	like to thank Mr. Gautreaux and
21	Mr. Smith. They worked on this rule, in
22	particular, to get it available and in a
23	manner and format for us to consider
24	today, so I appreciate that. Okay. Are
25	there any questions? Any questions by
	37
1	board members? Is there any public
2	comment with regard to institution of
3	the rulemaking? I'm not hearing any.
4	MR. BRADFORD: Is there a vote?
5	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: We'd need to have

5	also?
6	MR. GAUTREAUX: Correct. And as the
7	Chairman pointed out, we're meeting and
8	hopefully trying to get geographic
9	consistency, and that will all be part
10	of the process, too.
11	MS. ROGERS: Reduction in numbers?
12	MR. GAUTREAUX: That will be up to
13	the licensees to request for a petition.
14	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: I think this would
15	give some relief, but it also, in my
16	opinion, follows the intent of the
17	original legislation, which was to
18	provide betterment for Louisianians in
19	particular who worked and for the
20	suppliers and folks. And although it
21	to me it allows the casinos to get a
22	better product for a better cost, but
23	also it helps the Louisiana companies

24	and also companies that might not be a
25	Louisiana company but employ I think
	39
1	one of them employs over 400 people and
2	has trucks and distributorships here, et
3	cetera. Certainly that is beneficial to
4	the citizens of Louisiana.
5	So that's the whole point behind it.
6	MR. STIPE: And so really you would
7	have if I understand the underscores,
8	you would have a Louisiana company would
9	be a company that's owned here,
10	domiciled here, registered here
11	and/or or would be a company that
12	is that has physical operations here,
13	has facilities here and has employees
14	that are reported as employees to the
15	Louisiana Department of Revenue and all
16	of our agencies in terms of being
17	employed by a company in Louisiana.
18	MR. GAUTREAUX: Correct. It could
19	be both or either.
20	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: And that are
21	controlled.
22	MR. GAUTREAUX: And controlled, and
23	I think that's an important thing, that
24	they actually maintain control in
25	Louisiana and have people in Louisiana

1	running the operations here.
2	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Any other
3	questions?
4	MR. SINGLETON: I have one.
5	CHAIRMAN MORGAN: Mr. Singleton.
6	MR. SINGLETON: How does this affect
7	or will it affect I've got some
8	complaints lately about people in the
9	casino industry going on the national
